Arkansas State University President-Emeritus Dr. Eugene Smith was honored for leadership and service to the university, the Eugene W. Smith Hall was dedicated in a ceremony May 29. The building, which now bears Dr. Smith's name, is the former Chickasaw Student Services Center located at 106 North Caraway Road across from
